

Comprehensive Road Safety Rules for Truck Drivers

Pre-Departure Checks

Vehicle Inspection:

- Conduct a thorough pre-trip inspection of the truck, checking brakes, tires, lights, mirrors, wipers, steering, and fluid levels.
- Ensure that the cargo is properly secured, evenly distributed, and within legal weight limits.
- Verify that the trailer connections (such as fifth wheel, kingpin, and electrical) are secure.

Documentation:

- Carry all necessary documentation, including a valid driver's license, registration, insurance, permits, and any cargo-related paperwork.
- Ensure that the vehicle's insurance and registration are up to date.
- Keep emergency contact information readily available.

Route Planning:

- Plan your route in advance, considering traffic conditions, road closures, weather forecasts, and construction zones.
- Use GPS navigation systems or route planning apps to find the safest and most efficient routes.
- Be aware of low bridges, narrow roads, and weight-restricted areas along your route.

Safe Driving Practices

Speed Management:

- Adhere to posted speed limits, adjusting your speed according to road conditions, weather, and traffic flow.
- Slow down in work zones, school zones, and residential areas.
- Avoid sudden acceleration or braking, especially when carrying heavy loads.

Maintain Safe Distance:

- Keep a safe following distance from the vehicle in front of you, at least 4-6 seconds under normal driving conditions.
- Increase the following distance during adverse weather, heavy traffic, or when driving at high speeds.

Use of Signals:

- Always use turn signals well in advance of turning, merging, or changing lanes.
- Use hazard lights when stopped on the shoulder or in emergencies.
- Check mirrors and blind spots before changing lanes or making turns.

Avoid Distractions:

- Refrain from using mobile phones, eating, drinking, or engaging in other distracting activities while driving.
- Pull over to a safe location if you need to make or receive a call or address any distractions.

Stay Alert:

- Stay mentally and physically alert while driving, taking regular breaks to combat fatigue.
- Look out for hazards such as pedestrians, cyclists, animals, and debris on the road.
- Be aware of your surroundings, including other vehicles, signs, and road markings.

Visibility:

- Ensure good visibility by keeping mirrors clean, properly adjusted, and free from obstructions.
- Use headlights during adverse weather conditions, fog, rain, or low-light situations.
- Use high beams judiciously and dim them for oncoming traffic.

Obey Traffic Signs and Signals:

- Follow all traffic signs, signals, and regulations, including stop signs, yield signs, and traffic lights.
- Observe lane markings and avoid making illegal manoeuvres such as improper lane changes or U-turns.

Handling Difficult Situations

Adverse Weather:

- Adjust your driving behaviour to suit weather conditions, including rain, snow, ice, fog, or strong winds.
- Reduce speed and increase following distance in adverse weather, giving yourself plenty of time to react.
- Use caution on slippery roads and avoid sudden manoeuvres.

Emergencies:

- In case of a breakdown or emergency, move your vehicle to a safe location, ideally off the road and onto the shoulder.
- Activate hazard lights and place warning triangles or flares to alert other drivers.
- Contact emergency services or your dispatcher for assistance.

Fatigue Management:

- Take regular breaks to rest and stretch, especially during long hauls or overnight trips.
- Avoid driving for extended periods without adequate rest, adhering to legal driving hour limits.
- Know the signs of fatigue, including yawning, heavy eyelids, difficulty focusing, and slower reaction times.

Loading and Unloading

Loading Procedures:

- Ensure that cargo is properly loaded, secured, and evenly distributed to prevent shifting during transit.
- Follow loading guidelines to maintain the stability and balance of the vehicle.
- Check that cargo does not exceed weight limits and complies with load securement regulations.

Unload Safely:

- Exercise caution when unloading cargo, using appropriate equipment and procedures to prevent injuries.
- Follow company protocols for unloading, ensuring that you are in a safe location away from traffic.
